

## **Confirmation and our Youth programming**

Pr. Amy leads and **interactive children's message every Sunday** along with **Youth Jam after service 2 Sundays a month** - these are accessible to youth of all ages. In March, we burned palms and ate smores at the fire pit outside the church!

Pr. Amy also takes youth on field experiences - watch for announcements here and in the Sunday Bulletin. Recently, she took confirmation age youth to the Faithful Five event at Koronis Ministries: an introduction to Confirmation for middle school/high school students who are considering Confirmation. The Faithful Five:

Prayers - we visited various stations that led us in different ways to pray

Presence - we listened to a presentation on noticing how our attention to our faith life is vital for our formation as Christians

Gifts - we took an 80 question assessment that revealed spiritual talents that we are using every day even if we aren't consciously thinking about it

Service - we created a skit about a service project we might do in our congregation. Our group did a skit about starting a 'kindness campaign'

Witness - we heard testimony from one of our group leaders about his own faith journey

"I am excited and curious about all that we can do together as a Confirmation class, but most importantly, I am interested in endeavoring to grow in faith alongside the youth of Alexandria UMC. Confirmation changes the relationship a child has with their church, especially in terms of service and expression." ~Pr. Amy

then-interim Bishop David Bard. Consisting of a cross-section of clergy and laity, the team is exploring how to position our staffing, structure, and resources as we move ahead. The group isn't a decision-making body but rather a "think tank" to reimagine and suggest possibilities for the conference.

February 28,2022 Finance Report approved at the March Council meeting.

Year to date we have received \$34,115 in offerings and \$2,680 for building use for a total of \$36,995. Year to date operating expenses and apportionments totaled \$38,932. Year to date outflow has exceeded inflow by \$2,137. The general fund available balance on 2/28/2023 was \$7,597. Thank you for your support of the church.

May 2022: the clouds grew darker and darker, winds blew and shingles flew – right from the roof at Alexandria UMC. Yes we suffered extensive roof damage in the May storm necessitating approximately \$44,000 of work to re-shingle the roof. Council voted to take out a second mortgage in an amount of \$44,000 to cover these costs. Due to the wonderful response from congregation members and friends, no more than \$20,000 was ever advanced on the loan. As donations flowed in they were used to cover the bills from the contractor. We also received a gift from the Alexandria UMC Trust Fund. End result, last night at the Council meeting there was a balance of \$14,735.94 remaining on the second mortgage. Alexandria UMC has a contingency fund. This fund receives \$300 a month from building use and last fall when we received covid relief funding we

placed \$10,000 into the contingency account. Council took action last night to pay the remaining balance of the second mortgage from contingency funds. The second mortgage is paid off before the first anniversary of the damage. Thank you!

Our policy is that you only have to make one attempt to get a sub.

After one attempt to find a sub is unsuccessful, please call Ginger at the office, 320-763-4624, and she will line up the sub. Whenever possible, please give her a week's notice. We know that is not always possible and we completely understand.

Brief Descriptions of each Ministry - there is always mentorship - things change and our rituals and traditions adjust as needed.

Communion Steward - pour the juice and cut the bread 15 minutes prior to service. Placing the elements on the altar using our Communion bowls and cups. During the service of Word and Table (first Sunday of the month), led by Pr. Amy, stewards come forward and follow Pr. Amy's direction on serving the people.

Usher/Greeter - sometimes you are both! Greeting people as they come in - where they can hang their coat, give them a bulletin, overall being invitational. During worship, you may also be the acolyte (unless there are children present to do so) - this means light the candles on the altar during the first hymn and then snuff the candles out during the last hymn. Before worship, set up attendance books in each pew, collect them up afterward and put the papers in the safe along with the monies from the offering plates. During worship, you will pass around the offering plates and then set them on the altar after the offertory prayer. After service, offering gets put in the safe - if you are new at this, Pr. Amy will train you so don't worry! Ushers also excuse people from their pews on Communion Sundays (the first Sunday of every month), and pick up the sanctuary after service.

Liturgist - Scripture and all other passages that the liturgist would read for their assigned Sunday service are sent via email three days prior to the service unless requested to be sent sooner. Pr. Amy meets with all liturgists on Sunday morning prior to service. If a liturgist wants to practice their readings in the sanctuary prior to Sunday, they simply arrange that and we can have the mic and space prepared for them to practice.

#### Coffee fellowship - treats and clean-up

Bring goodies! Usually two pans of bars, 2 dozen cookies or a combination thereof is plenty. Washing out the coffee pots, putting things away fellowship - these instructions are all posted in the kitchen. If Carol isn't making the coffee, be sure to arrive 25 minutes prior to service to brew the coffee as well.

Over the next three months, we will review and update the Employee Handbook (last updated in 2019) and discuss an all-church review of a tool called 'Rule of Christ'. This tool provides an effective way to discuss concerns or complaints effectively and constructively. It has been several years since we last went through this training, so time to 'dust it off' and review!



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**Our Adopt a highway/Ditch clean up** is scheduled for Saturday May 6<sup>th</sup>. We will meet here at the church at 10:00 a.m. for donuts or cookies and coffee then head out at 10:30 a.m. to pick the 2 miles of ditches. We would like as many volunteers to help with this as the more people we have the faster it gets done. This will be our last year doing this if no one shows up to help. The last couple years there has not been a good turn out for this. Our rain backup day is Saturday May 13<sup>th</sup> with the same schedule as above.

**Food Shelf.** We have not heard from the outreach food shelf yet as to how many pounds of food was collected and dropped off yet. *Thank you* for all

of you who donated money or food. The money that we raised \$1101.75 was split between all the food shelves in the area all receiving \$100. (Kalon Prep, AAHS food shelf and Jennies cupboard at the Tech school) The outreach food shelf also received a check for 801.75. We are going to continue to collect

food year round for the little pantry food shelf at Alexandria First Free Methodist at 8<sup>th</sup> Ave and Jefferson Street. A basket will be on the desk by the door for the collection of food.

The Missions team will be collecting supplies for the Annual Conference this year to help with Our Love Offering this year will tangibly share God's extravagant love with a hurting world by addressing the growing mental health needs in Minnesota.

60% of the Love Offering will fund a new grant that will support churches that have partnerships with mental health services offered in local schools or communities.

30% of the Love Offering will go to three Minnesota nonprofits engaged in mental health education and advocacy: (10%) Mental Health Connect, (10%) Mental Health Minnesota, and (10%) Minnesota Association for Children's Mental Health.

Finally, 10 % of the Love Offering each year goes to Volunteers in Mission scholarships, which support first-time mission trip participants.

Missions committee is collecting supplies for UMCOR to bring to Annual Conference on May 31. They chose the Cleaning kit and below is a list of items needed for that kit. Basket is in the Narthex. **UMCOR CLEANING KIT ASSEMBLY & SHIPPING INSTRUCTIONS** 

(Kit approximate cost: \$75 per bucket)

Cleaning Kit Materials

- One five-gallon round bucket with re-sealable lid (14.35" h x 12.19" w x 12.19" d)
  - No screw lids
  - May be used, but must be free from all residual product
  - Advertisements on the outside acceptable
- One 32-64 oz. bottle liquid laundry detergent
- One 16-40 oz. bottle liquid concentrate household cleaner
  - No spray cleaners
- One 16-34 oz. bottle dish soap
- One 4-8 oz. pump spray air freshener (liquid, not gel)
- One 6-14 oz. pump spray insect repellent (pack of 10-20 wipes also acceptable)
  - Pump spray bottles must have protective covers
  - One scrub brush
    - with or without handle
- 18 re-useable cleaning wipes
  - No terrycloth, microfiber or paper towels
  - No stainless-steel pads with soap in them
  - Remove from packaging
- Five scouring pads
  - No stainless-steel pads with soap in them
  - Remove from packaging
- 36-50 clothespins
- One 50-100ft Clothesline (cotton or plastic line)
- 24 roll of heavy-duty trash bags (33-45 gallon sizes)
  - Remove from packaging
- 5 N95 respirator dust masks (1-3 mm thickness)
  - No surgical masks
- Two pairs kitchen gloves
  - Durable for multi use and Remove from packaging
- One pair of work gloves
  - Cotton with leather palm or all leather

• All items must be new with the exception of the bucket and lid which may be recycled but must be clean and free of debris.

All cleaning agents must be liquid form. No powders are accepted. Important Notes

- Sponges have been removed from the list of supplies due to the challenge of locating the non-cellulose sponges that prevent mildew. Non-cellulose sponges will be added to each bucket upon arrival at the affiliate warehouse.
- Do not include any personal notes, money or additional
- material in the kits.
- Contents of kits or the containers of kits should not be imprinted with cartoon characters, advertisements, religious, patriotic, military or camouflage symbols.
